In 1996, James "Pappy" Martin collaborated with Councilmember Byron Brown, Darryl Peebles, Council President James Pitts and Steve Porter to implement an innovative community enhancement program entitled Masten Jazz Festival. In 2015, upon the passing of Pappy Martin who continued the festival, the name was changed to the Pappy Martin Legacy - Masten Jazz Festival. It is held on the grounds of the Buffalo Museum of Science in Martin Luther King, Jr. Park, the heart and crown jewel of the Masten District. 
"Grammy-nominated artist and accomplished educator Tia **Fuller** has been the featured saxophonist with pop diva Beyoncé, featured on the I Am...Sasha Fierce, Experience, Bevoncé and Live at the Wynn Theatre worldwide tours (2006-2010). In addition, she served as assistant musical director for Esperanza Spalding's Radio Music Society tour and performed with Terri Lyne Carrington's Mosaic **Project and Money Jungle** tours.

Fuller has recorded five albums: Healing Space, Decisive Steps, Angelic Warrior, Pillar of Strength, and Diamond Cut, which received a Grammy nomination for Best Jazz Instrumental Album. Her quartet has performed at festivals all over the world, including in Panama, the Netherlands, Italy, Angola, and South Africa.

Fuller has been featured on the cover of DownBeat and JazzTimes, and in a national J.Jill campaign celebrating dynamic women in the arts. An opinion piece she wrote for NBC News, "2019 Grammy Awards: Why I'm Using My Nomination to Speak out in the World

of Jazz," has drawn widespread acclaim. She has received numerous awards and marks of distinction, winning the JazzTimes Critics' Poll for best alto saxophonist (2018) and the DownBeat International Critics' Poll Rising Star award (2013 and 2014). She received the Benny Golson Award from Howard University in 2018.

Tia Fuller, Saxophone Curtis Lundy, Double Bass Giveton Gelin, Trumpet Victor Gould, Piano Herlin Riley, Drums



Born in 1955, Curtis Lundy is a double bassist, composer, producer, choir director, and arranger. Lundy began his musical career in the All Miami Youth Jazz Band and was classically trained at the University of Miami under the tutelage of renowned bassist Dr. Lucas Drew. He has studied privately with Cecil McBee, Linda McKnight, Jaco Pastorius, and Ron Carter.

Best-known for his work as part of jazz vocalist Betty Carter's band, Lundy made his debut on the New York jazz scene in 1978. Over the years he has performed with an impressive list musicians, including: of Art Blakely, John Griffin, Freddie Hubbard, Paroah Sanders, John Hicks, Wynton Marsalis, Branford Marsalis, George Coleman, Clark Terry, Sam Rivers, the Savoy Sultans, Bobby Watsom, Stanley Turnetine, Mohamed, Idris Steve Nelson Quintet, Mulgrew Miller, Hammiet Bluiet, Don Pullen, Elvin Jones, Hank Jones, Sonny Stitt, Jon Faddis, Hilton Ruiz, Eddie "Lockjaw" Davis, **Phyllis** Hyman, Lionel Hampton, Phineas Newborn, Johnny Hartman, Charlie Persip,

Louis Hayes, Bobby Hutcherson, Barry Harris, and Frank Morgam.

In the late 1980's, he issued Just Be Yourself (1989) and a decade later, with Justin Time Records, he released Against All Odds (1999) followed by Purpose (2002). Lundy remains one of the most spiritually uplifting bassists on the jazz scene today. He is featured on the G-Three recording SWIFT with Billy Robinson on sax, Stacie McGregor on piano, and Billy Hart on drums. Lundy's arrangement on "Walk With Me," recorded by the ARC Gospel Choir, was sampled by rapper Kanye West and became the Grammy Award-winning hit "Jesus Walks." This arrangement was also sampled in "This is Why I'm Hot" by Shawn Mims.

CHARENEE WADE

Charenee Wade, Vocals Paul Beaudy, Bass Darrell Green, Drums Oscar Perez, Piano

Charenee Wade is not one to hold back or let fear stand in her way. The first artist ever to enter two Thelonious Monk Vocal competitions, she walked away from the second one in 2010 with instant buzz and second place to her new friend Cecilé McLorin Salvant. Now is the time for Wade's star to rise. Known for expert vocal improvisational ability and her seriously swinging groove, Wade evokes a classic jazz sound akin to Betty Carter and Sarah Vaughan, two of her musical touchstones. With her Motéma debut, Offering: The Music of Gil Scott-Heron and Brian Jackson (June 23), she pays tribute to another inspiration, the socially conscious poet and musician Gil Scott-Heron, and confirms that she too plans to use her artist platform thoughtfully.

The first full-length album tribute to Scott-Heron and his musical collaborator Brian Jackson by a woman artist, Offering is arresting in just how timely Scott-Heron's messages are today and how perfectly Wade delivers them through her savvy arrangements and intimate jazz interpretations. While she has earned many accolades - first runner-up in New York's Jazzmobile Vocal competition; a participant in Betty Carter's Jazz Ahead program; a feature on NPR's Song Travels; a starring role in the off-Broadway show Café Society and in Jazz at Lincoln Center's Salute to Betty Carter - she may surprise people with this authentic tour de force.

Wade embodies Scott-Heron's poems deeply and with a pathos that belies her age. Her singing is effortless and inventive on the opening title track, and with her lithe voice floating around the poet's timeless words, we are invited into her invocation. Indeed "Song of the Wind" feels like a sacred exchange between the past and present and a testament to the peace we're still seeking today. "A Toast to The People" showcases her excellent storytelling ability and subtle vocal prowess. On "Home Is Where the Hatred Is," she and the band throw down the gauntlet both in terms of the powerful message and jazz chops on display.

Like Scott-Heron, Wade believes that we are the ones right now who must commit to social consciousness and to just action, as she makes plain in "Ain't No Such Thing As A Superman," which she mines for its jazz, blues and soul elements. The call to action continues in the next selection, "Essex/Martin, Grant, Byrd and Till," as the story and names recited by actor Malcolm-Jamal Warner could be exchanged

today with those of Martin, Brown, Garner and sadly, many more. Wade goes into a slow burn on "Western Sunrise" and the poignant track, "The Vulture (Your Soul and Mine)." Her finesse with language, intervals, dynamics and emotive ability is on brilliant display in "Peace Go With You Brother." The closing song "I Think I'll Call It Morning" signals that hope is always what drives positive change.

Produced by Grammy-nominated music industry veteran and Sirius XM personality Mark Ruffin, the recording features notable guest stars and a stellar band comprised of Brandon McCune on piano; Dave Stryker on guitar; Lonnie Plaxico on bass; and Alvester Garnett on drums. Wade's labelmate, saxophonist Lakecia Benjamin, sits in on "Essex/Martin," as does Marcus Miller on bass clarinet and actor Malcolm-Jamal Warner on spoken word. Another spoken word guest is bassist Christian McBride, who opens "Peace Go With You Brother." The great vibes player Stefon Harris is featured on six selections. Wade's first international release follows on the recent publication of a biography on Scott-Heron by Marcus Baram called "Gil Scott-Heron: Pieces of A Man."

Wade gives ample evidence on this remarkable debut as to why she is one of the most exciting, distinctive and bold she began singing at age 12 and fell under the spell of for the Performing Arts and earned her music degree from Manhattan School of Music. One of four artists selected for the Dianne Reeves Young Artist workshop at Carnegie Hall, she was first runner-up at the 2006 New York City Jazzmobile Vocal Competition, which also featured Gregory Porter, whom Motéma launched into global stardom. The entire jazz industry has passionately embraced Wade including Wynton Marsalis, who features her regularly at Jazz at Lincoln Center (JALC); Christian McBride, who mentored her at his Jazz Aspen Academy; and labelmate Rufus Reid, who selected her for his Grammy-nominated album, Quiet Pride: The Elizabeth Fellow and choreographer Kyle Abraham among others and at venues and festivals worldwide including Montreux and Spoleto. This year she is touring in Jazz at Lincoln Center's national presentation, Ladies Sing the Blues.

KEYON HARROLD

Keyon Harrold, Trumpet Nir Felder, Guitar Charles Hayes, Drums Shedrick Mitchell, Piano Burniss Travis, Bass

Keyon Harrold was born and raised in Ferguson, MO, the St. Louis suburb that tore into America's national consciousness in 2014 with the police shooting of Michael Brown and the bitter protests and riots that followed. While Ferguson looms large in Harrold's album The Mugician, it examines our troubled times through a far wider lens than any one tragedy. Sweeping and cinematic, the music draws on elements of jazz, classicval, rock, blues, and hip hop to create something uniquely modern, unmistakably American. Guests including Pharoahe Monch, Gary Clark, Jr., Big K.R.I.T., Guy Torry, Georgia Anne Muldrow and Robert Glasper add to the record's eclectic nature, but it ultimately triumphs as a unified, cohesive whole both because of Harrold's virtuosic skill as a trumpeter and songwriter and because of his relentlessly optimistic belief in brighter days to

Harrold grew up one of 16 children in a family that prioritized music and community across generations. His grandfather was a police officer who retired from the force to found a drum and bugle corps for local youth, both of his parents were pastors, and nearly all of his siblings sing and perform music today. Culture shock hit Harrold hard at 18, when he left Ferguson for New York City to enroll in The New School. In New York, he landed his first major gig with Common, an experience which he says broadened his musical horizons beyond jazz to include funk, Afrobeat, R&B, and hip hop. Soon he was performing with stars like Snoop Dogg, Jay Z, Beyonce, Rihanna, Eminem, Maxwell, and Anthony Hamilton.

In 2009, he released his solo debut, Introducing Keyon Harrold and then won wide acclaim for his trumpet performances in Don Cheadle's Miles Davis biopic Miles Ahead. The Mugician

is a portmanteau of "musician" and "magician, a nod to a nickname Cheadle bestowed upon the young virtuoso, and it's an apt descriptor for a record that pushes beyond the traditional boundaries of jazz trumpet. In fact, the album doesn't even begin with trumpet, but rather with a track called 'Voicemail,' which features an inspirational message from Harrold's mother set to a stirring, orchestral soundscape. Entirely unedited, her words lay the groundwork for an album that celebrates the importance of family (ten of Keyon's siblings appear on the record) and the absolute necessity of optimism in the face of darkness and doubt. These days, Harrold is a parent himself, and he pays tribute to his son with a pair of tracks on the album, "Lullaby" and "Bubba Rides Again." Issues of identity and equality percolate throughout the record, sometimes subtly beneath the surface, sometimes more pointedly, as in "Circus Show." However, the album's most powerful moments come with the one-two punch of "MB Lament" and "When Will It Stop," songs written in the wake of Michael Brown's death and the senseless killings of so many others like him.

It's a monumental task, one that calls for tremendous empathy and sensitivity. To give voice to the silenced requires more than just talent and ambition, it requires faith, imagination, strength, and determination. Above all, it requires perspective. Fortunately, that is what Keyon Harrold brings most of all.



If you haven't caught Johnny O'Neal lately, you really should. The Detroit-born pianist and vocalist, whose fabled history includes a stint as a Jazz Messenger in the '80s and an appearance as Art Tatum in the 2004 movie Ray, and whose personal health battles appear to be mostly behind him, is hale and confident. Onstage, his attitude is sunny, funny and positive. The 61-year-old fits better these days into the brocaded jackets and hats he often wears, and his well-known command of postbop piano and sense of dynamics are stronger than ever-all energetic leaps and fluid rhythmic shifts, as he laughs and grunts and gasps in mock surprise. Then he'll close his eyes, downshift the tempo and out comes that blues-soaked voice. With his buoyant personality and an unpredictable set list filled with obscure blues, ballads and more recent popular songs he chooses to ballad-ize—Nat Cole to Donny Hathaway, Chaka Khan to Eubie Blake-it's a joy to hear. Even when he repeats himself, it never gets old.

O'Neal's continuing revival benefits from the support he receives overseas—like his European agent, Giulio Vannini, who helps put him on festival stages where he charms audiences of hundreds with nuanced music normally suited for more intimate venues. Those rooms include Manhattan clubs like Smoke, Smalls and Mezzrow, which serve as his home base and where his gigs consistently sell out. His new album for the Smoke label, aptly titled In the Moment features his regular trio with bassist Ben Rubens and drummer Itay Morchi, two young players who bring the needed fast-thinking skills to creatively respond to the impromptu, mid-song twists on which O'Neal's performances thrive. The recording also boasts contributions from trumpeter Roy Hargrove and saxophonist Grant Stewart.

This was O'Neal's first Before & After. It took place the afternoon before his Nice Jazz Festival performance this past July, in the Hard Rock Cafe a block from the festival grounds on the city's Promenade des Anglais. Despite misgivings the day before, he was relaxed and ready to listen and respond to the music. He settled into his chair, taking in the bright Mediterranean vista, and immediately began sharing stories, recalling that his last visit to the city was "way back when, in the '90s, when the Grand Parade du Jazz was here and George Wein was doing it. It was beautiful then. It still is now."

Marcus Lolo is a Haitian-American pianist, keyboardist and vocalist. Claiming both Port-au-Prince Haiti and New York City as home, he carries in his music the cultural stamps of both his ancestral home and the cultural diversity to which the big apple has exposed him. His musical act is therefore diverse and ranging from jazz adaptations of Haitian folk songs to the urban sound of modern Jazz fusion. He would form the Marcus Lolo Jazz quartet in 2017 along with Erikos Vlesmas (Bass); Ricky Hoover (Guitar); Nathaniel Cadet (Drums) which grew into a quintet with the addition of Dalton Sharp (Saxophones) in 2019. They would together grace the stage of Pausa Art House for his Buffalo debut in January 2018 and be met with great appreciation by the local audience of musical enthusiasts. Marcus and the Band hope through their artistry to inspire their audience and offer a source of creative expression to all who choose to listen.

Growing up on Buffalo NY's west side, in a very diverse melting pot of cultures, Kevin learned his appreciation for the many styles of music that have helped shape who he is today. From such influences as Grover Washington Jr, David Sanborn, George Benson, Grant Green, Charlie Parker, John Coltrane, Michael Jackson, The Police, Chicago, Kiss, and Supertramp just to name a few, Kevin's eclectic tastes have helped to give his smooth jazz a freshness and a distinct sound. Kevin has shared stages with Pieces Of A Dream, Fred Hammond & The RFC, and the Dave Matthews tribute band The Dreaming Tree and is the saxophonist for David M Miller and The Other Sinners. Nelson 'Poppa" Lucas, Guitar/Bass Zaimah Beloved, Vocals Vince Fossitt, Saxophone Anthony Gaines, Drums Synyer Haynesworth, Percussions



WILLIAM MURPHY



William O. Murphy, born August 15, 1948, began playing saxophone after hearing and being inspired by John Coltrane in 1969. In Buffalo, NY, he studied his chosen instrument by hanging out and listening to local players which led him to lessons with saxophone master, Elvin Shepard. (2016 Honoree of the Year / Pappy Martin Legacy-Masten Jazz Festival)

Murphy moved to San Francisco in 1974 and joined a group along with three other musicians from Buffalo, Hassan Jahl, Imari Amani and Encosi Virgil Day. He continued to hone his skills by playing with an assortment of bands, eventually recording with Norman Conners and Onaji Allen Gumbs. On that path, he continued his commitment to excellence by engaging and studying with the great Joe Henderson, a master of his craft whose artistry remains world renowned. Returning to Buffalo in 1989, he met Pappy Martin on his first night back and, shortly after, joined his quartet, A Love Supreme. During this time, they spent many hours studying, practicing and playing together with master musician/pianist Al Tinney. As a result, when Pappy opened the Love Supreme School of Music in 2001, Murphy became a valuable instructor who positively impacted many students throughout the time he taught there. He also inspired and taught many other students through private lesson endeavors which continued until his recent health challenges.

Over the years, Murphy performed with many big bands and small combos to maximize his experiences as a versatile musician, albeit his passion was in the jazz genre. He remained a cherished and respected member of the Love Supreme Jazz Ensemble until the passing of Pappy in 2015. He spent his most recent years as a valued musician with the band ODYSSEY led by Lonnie Crittenden.

William Murphy is a musician whose expertise and passion as a great jazz saxophonist has brought pleasure to many audiences throughout his career. His demeanor remains humble and he is a man whose integrity and dedication to his craft is evident whenever he shares his verbal or musical conversation.

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
